Computer Science Program Director and Associate Professor of Computer Science

Lincoln Memorial University, a private, comprehensive university offering undergraduate, graduate, and professional programs, seeks an experienced administrator with proven organizational and leadership skills to serve as the inaugural **Director of the Computer Science Program**. Reporting to the Dean of the School of Mathematics and Sciences, this administrator will be responsible for developing the University's new Computer Science Program and will hold the rank of **Associate Professor**.

THE OPPORTUNITY

For 121 years, Lincoln Memorial University (LMU) has been educating men and women within a values-based learning community. With the historic campus located an hour north of Knoxville, Tenn., the University serves nearly 4,800 undergraduate, graduate, and professional students on- and off-campus.

The Computer Science Program was recently approved, with classes to be offered in Fall 2018. The Bachelor of Science degree program will be housed in the School of Mathematics and Sciences.

A 10-month position, the Computer Science Program Director will oversee the development and administration of the Computer Science major, including curriculum development, student advising, program assessment, and faculty and student recruitment. With operational decision-making authority for this major, this academic administrator will need to be an effective self-starter, decision-maker, problem-solver, and strategic planner.

In addition to its administrative role, the Program Director will be an instructional faculty member with responsibilities in the areas of teaching, research/creative

achievement, and service functions. The Director shall be held accountable for these obligations as they contribute to the attainment of the mission of the University, the School, and the Department.

Additional duties include:

- Promote the mission of LMU to all faculty, staff, and students, as well as the community at-large.
- Promote effective working relationships and communication among faculty, staff, and students.
- Comply with the Faculty/Staff Policy Manual and any other regulations, requirements, and procedures of the University.
- Engage in professional development.
- Assist with the development and implementation of program's Student Recruitment and Retention Plan.
- Assist in the development, implementation, and monitoring of the Long-Range Strategic Plan and Outcomes Assessment Plan for the assigned programs.

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- Assist program or university reports and schedules, as requested.
- Appropriately align course syllabi goals and objectives to academic major program goals and student outcomes for each course taught
- Develop and distribute a current syllabus for each assigned class.
- Serve as advisor to LMU's student programing team for competitions.
- Participate in the faculty evaluation process, utilizing the results to improve teaching and strengthen the program.
- Attend and/or participate in events, meetings, and programs that support the School institution, faculty, staff, and/or students.
- Complete required program reports and other documentation

as necessary for the operation and advancement of the University.

QUALIFICATIONS

An earned Ph.D. in Computer Science or appropriate related discipline from a regionally accredited institution, or a foreign equivalent, is required. Candidate must have highly successful experience as a teacher and scholar at the level of associate professor or higher.

Preferred Qualifications:

- Academic leadership experience, such as program assessment
- Experience with student projects, cooperative educational arrangements with industry partners, and internships with industry partners

Candidates also should have:



- Excellent interpersonal and communication skills, both oral and written
- Demonstrated knowledge and mastery of content
- Demonstrated knowledge of student advising
- Evidence of scholarly work, including research publication and creative achievement
- Grant development capability
- Effective management skills

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THE UNIVERSITY

Lincoln Memorial University is a private, comprehensive university that offers associate, bachelor, master, and doctoral degrees. With the historic campus in Harrogate, Tenn., the institution provides academic programs at 10 extended learning sites across Tennessee, Florida, and Kentucky.

Founded in 1897, LMU was established out of admiration and respect for the nation's 16th president, Abraham Lincoln, and today honors his name, values, and spirit through providing quality education and service. Throughout the past 121 years, the University has provided educational opportunities, developed community leadership, and expanded the economic and social forces within the Appalachian region.

The coeducational institution is strong and growing with enrollment increasing more than 60 percent over the last decade. More than 4,800 students are pursuing undergraduate or post-graduate degrees in LMU's nine schools and colleges:

Providing a challenging academic program in an engaged-learning environment and close-knit community, LMU faculty members know students as individuals and are committed to preparing them for successful careers. More than 75 percent of the full-time faculty teaching undergraduate programs have doctorates or the highest degree in their field. The average class size is 13 students.

Nestled in the pristine Appalachian Mountain range, the 1,000-acre campus in Harrogate has been expanding rapidly to meet the growing demands of new programs and the increased enrollment.

New campus additions include a 140,000-plus-square-foot classroom

and laboratory building, which houses math, science, and nursing classrooms and labs, along with space for student and faculty research, and a driving range and a three-hole executive golf course.

A significant component of the LMU experience is service. All undergraduate students who receive institutional financial aid from the University are required to participate in a 10-hour service-learning component each semester. The Student Service Initiative provides students with opportunities to become involved in service learning projects and community service.

LMU offers Student Support Services, which is a federally funded program that provides advising, tutoring, career planning, cultural activities, and freshmen mentoring to qualified students. These services are specifically targeted to students who are first-generation college students and/or financially eligible under federal guidelines, and/or physical or learning disabled.

LMU has several new residence halls. The Residential Life Program is designed to help students make the transition from home life to residential hall life in a healthy and successful manner. All full-time students under the age of 21, regardless of class ranking, live on campus unless the



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student is living with a parent or guardian within a 65-mile radius of campus or is married and lives with a spouse.

For many students, the individual cost to attend LMU is less than the cost associated with state schools. Nearly 90 percent of LMU undergraduate students receive some type of financial assistance through a combination of scholarships and need-based financial aid.

Employees of LMU have the opportunity to enroll their own students in the J. Frank White Academy (JFWA). This is a college preparatory school located on the Harrogate campus. Fully accredited by AdvanceEd, the Academy serves average- and above-average-ability students in grades 5 through 12.

The School of Mathematics and Sciences creates several STEM outreach opportunities to support the mission of LMU in serving the Appalachian region. These include a STEM Academy for rising high school seniors, hosting a regional Science Olympiad Invitational, and the Appalachian Summer Medical Institute for pre-med college juniors and seniors from the region.

The LMU Railsplitters are a member of the South Atlantic Conference of NCAA Division II. The University fields 10 men's sports – baseball, basketball, bowling, cross country, golf, lacrosse, soccer, tennis, track & field, and volleyball – and 11 women's sports – basketball, beach volleyball, bowling,

cross country, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, tennis, track & field, and volleyball.

HARROGATE, TENNESSEE
